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1. Background and overview of the scheme

The [UK India Education & Research Initiative \(UKIERI\) Mobility Programme: Study in India](#) provides flexible grants to UK higher education providers (HEPs) and their Indian partner institutions to design and deliver academically rigorous short-term mobility opportunities in India for undergraduate (or equivalent) students from UK HEPs.

In excess of £1,000,000 of grant funding is available for this pilot programme. The upper limit for awards is £60,000.

UKIERI is a multi-stakeholder partnership programme supported by various government funding partners. UKIERI Study in India grants are funded by the UK Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS), the UK Department for Education (DfE) and the Indian Ministry for Human Resource Development (MHRD). Grant-funding allocated to successful UK HEPs will be drawn from the UK sources (BEIS & DfE); funding for the partner institutions in India will be drawn from the Indian source (MHRD).

The UKIERI Study in India programme is managed in partnership by British Council India and Universities UK International (UUKi). For this programme, MHRD's delivery partner in India is EdCIL.

2. Objectives and aims of the programme

UK HEPs are invited to set out how they and their Indian partners would use block grants to deliver a dynamic short-term mobility programme for UK students in India.

Proposals should be led and submitted by a UK HEP but developed in partnership with an eligible Indian higher education institution. Eligible Indian institutions for this scheme are the 101 Partner Institutions for the EdCIL Study in India (SII) programme. The 101 institutions are among the most highly ranked in the Government of India's [National Institutional Ranking Framework](#) and have high national accreditation scores. Please see **Annex A** for a full list of the 101 eligible Indian institutions for this programme.

The objectives of the *UKIERI Mobility Programme: Study in India* scheme are to:

- Increase the levels of outward student mobility from the UK, in line with the UK's national strategy on outward student mobility and UUKi's national campaign [Go International: Stand Out](#);

- Enhance the employability of UK graduates, recognising the positive correlation between international experience, academic performance and graduate employability;
- Support the internationalisation of Indian higher education institutions in line with the Government of India's 'Study in India' programme through the diversification of the student body, and through establishing links with the potential to seed deeper institutional partnerships and research collaboration.

3. Eligibility

The *UKIERI Mobility Programme: Study in India* is open to applications from any UK higher education provider (HEP). Eligible Indian partner institutions for this scheme are listed in **Annex A**.

Applications are limited to **two per UK HEP**, with no more than one per department or faculty.

Completed application forms must be submitted online along with:

- (1) a letter of support from a senior representative of the UK HEP (e.g. VC, PVC, or Head of Study Abroad);
- (2) a letter of support from a senior representative of the eligible Indian partner institution (e.g. VC, PVC or another senior individual); and
- (3) a breakdown of proposed costs, using the budget spreadsheet template provided.

Proposals must:

- state the number of UK undergraduate (or equivalent) students that will benefit from this opportunity;
- state the length of the mobility period(s) to be offered to UK students in India (minimum 2 weeks; maximum 12 weeks);
- specify the eligible partner institution in India that will be hosting UK students on jointly developed short term programmes of academic activities. A full list of the eligible Indian institutions is in **Annex A**; and
- outline the nature and extent of the relationship (new or existing) with the Indian partner institution.

There is no minimum or maximum number of students that can participate, provided the total funding requested is no more than £60,000 and the bid represents value for money.

Proposals can request funding to cover the costs of UK HEP staff members accompanying UK students to India. The costs required for up to two members of UK HEP staff and no more than one member of UK HEP staff for every five UK students can be covered by the grant.

It is not necessary for proposals to confirm the start and end dates of the proposed mobility period(s) at the application stage. However, all mobility funded through this programme under a single grant must take place in *either* summer 2020 (between **01 June and 30 September 2020**) or in winter 2020/21 (between **01 December 2020 and 24 January 2021**).

Please note that mobility opportunities funded through this programme can only be taken up by students enrolled at the UK HEP. Priority will be given to proposals that provide opportunities to students from under-represented groups.

4. Eligible costs and profile of spend

Funding awarded through *UKIERI Mobility Programme: Study in India* will be distributed directly to the UK HEP and the Indian partner institution. UK HEPs are required to specify as part of their application the level of funding that is required under each budget category.

Funding distributed **to the UK HEP** is to cover:

- **Travel:** one economy class return flight, in-country transfers, visa processing costs, vaccinations and travel insurance (up to a maximum of £1,200 per student)
- **Subsistence** (up to a maximum of £70 per student per week)
- **Accommodation** (up to a maximum of £150 per student per week in Tier 1 cities - Bangalore, Chennai, Delhi, Hyderabad, Kolkata, Mumbai, Lucknow; up to a maximum of £100 per week for all other cities) *
- **Contribution to UK HEP administrative costs** (£100 per student)
- **Funding for accompanying staff members**, if required: travel (up to £1,200) and accommodation costs (up to a maximum of £150 per student per week in Tier 1 cities - Bangalore, Chennai, Delhi, Hyderabad, Kolkata, Mumbai, Lucknow; up to a maximum of £100 per week for all other cities) * and subsistence (up to £70 per week)

Funding distributed **to the Indian partner institution** is to cover:

- **Academic activities**, such as joint workshops, conference attendance or completion of short courses (up to a maximum of £200 per student per week)

Activities can include both classroom-based **and** non-classroom-based activities (e.g. industry visits; workplace tours; NGOs) as part of the mobility experience, provided clear learning outcomes are demonstrated. All of the eligible 101 Study in India partner institutions offer a variety of short courses, which may be of interest to UK universities and their students and can form part of the proposed programme of academic activities.

***Please note:** if the accommodation chosen for UK students is on campus at the Indian partner institution, then the funding for accommodation costs will be paid directly to the Indian partner institution, with no funding for accommodation paid to the UK HEP. It is up to the UK HEP to decide on the most appropriate accommodation arrangements for their students. UK universities have primary duty of care for their students.

All costs should be estimated as accurately as possible at the time of applying; any unspent grant funding will need to be returned to the funder at the end of the programme.

Payment of award

Awards will be paid directly to the successful UK HEPs and their Indian partner institution. UK HEPs will receive the grant payment in up to two instalments, and Indian institutions in one single payment.

Payments to the successful **UK HEPs** will be made by electronic transfer by the **British Council**; payments to the **Indian partner institutions** will be made directly by **EdCIL**.

The grant payment schedule will be confirmed in the grant letter sent to successful institutions.

Grant-holding UK HEPs will be required to notify the British Council India and UUKi in the event of any unexpected changes occurring that have an impact on the cost profile so that the final payment can be adjusted accordingly. Any unspent grant funding will need to be returned to the funder.

5. How to apply

The deadline for applications is 11.59pm (BST) on Monday 14 October 2019

All applications must be submitted using the [online application form](#).

Proposals should provide:

- Details of the programme of work and academic activities that will be undertaken (number of beneficiaries, number of workshops etc.)
- Details of the HEP's relationship with the proposed Indian partner institution
- Details of the due diligence and risk management processes that will be in place
- Details of how the programme will be academically rigorous and ensure learning outcomes are met (e.g. student projects, reflective essays, workshop content etc)
- A letter of support from a senior representative of the UK HEP
- A letter of support from the proposed eligible Indian partner institution detailing the support that will be provided to visiting UK students whilst in India as well as detailing any other local partners that will be involved in delivering the academic activities and their associated costs
- Details of the pre-departure support for UK students, including in relation to safety and security
- Anticipated academic and/or employability outcomes for beneficiaries and how these would be monitored and evaluated
- Details of the sustainability of the partnership - ensuring benefits endure beyond the funding period
- A clear breakdown of the expected expenditure and the institution (UK HEP/ eligible Indian partner institution) that will incur the costs (to be specified in the budget spreadsheet)

6. Evaluating proposals

All eligible applications will be scored by review panel members. Scoring will be out of 60 against four main criteria. These are:

- **Mobility programme design** (out of 20)
- **Operational capacity and cost effectiveness** (out of 15)
- **Student support and experience** (out of 15)
- **Impact and sustainability** (out of 10)

The full selection criteria can be found at **Annex B**.

Priority will be given to proposals that focus on providing mobility opportunities for students from under-represented groups.

The review panel will comprise student mobility experts from the UK and India. Each application will be reviewed and scored by *at least* two members of the review panel. The highest scoring applications will then be shortlisted for further review at a selection panel, where the final funding decisions will be made.

The selection panel will be attended by review panel members, with representatives from both the UK and India. The final decision of the selection panel will be approved by the UKIERI Governance Board.

The applicant's HEP has submitted no more than two applications under this call	
One eligible Indian partner institution is included on the application form	
The institution applying is a UK higher education provider (HEP)	
Mobility opportunities must take place between either 01 June 2020 and 30 September 2020 <u>OR</u> between 01 December 2020 and 15 January 2021	
Mobility periods must be no shorter than 2 weeks and no longer than 12 weeks
